

What happens in an Early Help Assessment?

You will be fully involved and we will listen to you. It may be that we just talk to you and point you to the support you want.

If it's a bit more complicated, we'll need to ask you for information that we write down or type. This is so we can get the right information and share it (if you agree) with people who need to know, so we can better understand your circumstances and match up services that would best support you.

You'll get a plan showing what you want to achieve and the support you need.

An EHA is used nationally and is a key part of working together to support families.

Can I say no to an early help assessment?

Yes you can. But we would like to stay in contact with you in case your circumstances alter or you change your mind.

What happens when I stop receiving Early Help Services?

We want you to become confident and able to find your own solutions and take responsibility for your family.

You can continue to use all services that are open to families and children, and if your needs change then please ask us for further help if you need it.

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There are times when children, young people and families need extra help. Someone might offer this to you, but other times you might want to ask for it.

Every family has its 'ups and downs'. Being a parent is hard work and there are no instructions.

Sometimes, you or your children may need extra support. This may be before your children are born, when they are very young, or throughout their school years.

There is nothing to be ashamed of in asking for help.

Early Help helps you recognise what's going well for you, where you may benefit from extra help and who is the best person to work with you and your family to make this happen.

Early Help may be through:

Children First



or

an Early Help Assessment (EHA).



What is early help?

Early help is a way of getting extra support when your family needs it, but getting it as soon as difficulties start, rather than waiting until things get worse.

It's for children and young people of any age. Help can come from all kinds of services and organisations who work together to support your family. You might be using some of these services already, but we want to make sure they are providing the right support for you and your family's needs.

Why would I seek early help?

It could be that you're worried about your child's health, development or behaviour or perhaps because you are caring for a disabled child.

Maybe your child is affected by domestic abuse, drugs or alcohol? Perhaps your child is a carer for other people?



What sort of services or help do I get?

It depends on what you need and it might include services you already get. We will agree it with you and make sure it all joins up.

Where emerging needs are identified, the school may make a referral to:

- Children First, South Derbyshire Schools Family Support Service. Targeted early-intervention support to address emerging needs relating to education, social welfare or other issues will be put in place.
- An Early Help Assessment Form may be completed with parents/carers. They will identify where support is needed and formulate a plan for the family (either in-house or support/ involvement of an outside agency). This plan will be reviewed regularly and, if necessary, further actions identified.

If there is no improvement to the welfare of the child, and there are escalating concerns around the safety and wellbeing of a child it is likely that there will be a referral to Starting Point.

We would, if appropriate, discuss this with parents/ carers first.
