This template can be used for multiple purposes:

 It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Curriculum Development & Teaching Quality	 Introduced/ organised diverse PE curriculum mapped over a 2-year cycle, ensuring clear progression in skills from EYFS to Y6. Completed a resource audit and reorganised the PE store, making equipment more accessible. Provided 1 staff CPD sessions inclusion in PE resulting in staff reporting increased confidence in teaching PE – staff questionnaire. Conducted learning walks and pupil-voice surveys showin pupils enjoy PE and can talk confidently about their learning. 	
Raising the Profile of PE & Whole-School Impact	 Established a PE working wall and hall display, updated termly to showcase progression and celebrate achievements. Shared numerous sporting updates via newsletters, Class Dojo, increasing parental engagement. Sports Day/Week saw all children across the school engaging in a wide variety of sports. High levels of enthusiasm, as shown by pupil voice and parent comments on the dojo posts. 	

Competitive Sport & Wider Experiences Entered 28 inter-school competitions (e.g. netball, football, athletics), with 199 **pupils** (67%) representing the school. • Achieved medals / certificates / awards in local events: Cross country – progressed to county finals Football lks2 won a tournament, ks2 won a tournament KS1 athletics won tournament Provided 3 taster sessions in minority or new sports - badminton, martial arts, curling, reaching 100% of pupils including EYFS 12% of places were filled by PP children – this was 20 different children - pupil voice with children/ photos/ conversations with parents show a positive impact on their well-being, self-esteem and enjoyment. Offered a wider range of after-school clubs: dodgeball, tennis, athletics, football - growing from 1 Extracurricular Opportunities club in 2023-24 to 4 clubs each week in 2024-25. Organsied PE timetable ensured all children get their 2 PE lessons per week. Pupil Engagement & Inclusion Staff trained in inclusion in PE – learning walks show some of these techniques being implemented. Launched daily mile sessions, with 22 pupils attending regularly with additional children from active bodies, leading to improved focus and classroom behaviour.
